COURSE CREDIT REQUIREMENTS & GRADING

Your final grade will depend on the number of points you score. You can get the maximum of 100 points if you

- attend all lectures for a maximum of 27 points (each unexcused absence reduces your score by 1.5 points)
- hand in 3 written assignments for a maximum of 33 points
 - Written assignments are due at the end of class on the due date and will not be accepted as email attachments.

 - Both the midterm and the final exam are closed book and closed notes. No additional materials will be necessary.
